Vicar's Report April 2023 'Green shoots'

It was a delight to gather together on 21st May 2023 to be licenced as Mission Enabler/Priest in Charge here at St Paul and St Stephen. That was almost a year ago! It was a beautiful service and my family and I are very grateful for the warm welcome to the parish and to Gloucester.

As I sit to write this report, I would like to begin with a few 'thank yous'. Firstly, I would like to thank my predecessor The Rev'd Ruth Fitter and the former curate The Rev'd Heather De Gruyther. We are grateful for their ministry here and pray that God may continually bless them in their current and future ministries. A special thank you to Ruth Parsons and Andy Winter who worked incredibly hard as churchwardens, together with the PCC during the vacancy. A thank you also to the members of clergy who offered their ministry here in that time, especially to The Rev'd Mike Parsons, The Rev'd Pat Gifford and The Rev'd Charles Minchin. I am also grateful to the churchwardens Ruth and Andy, the PCC, the ministry team, and all members of the congregation for your support in this my first year of ministry here at St Paul and St Stephen.

It is a pleasure to be working alongside Rev'd Sonya Newton in this area. In June 2023, Sonya was appointed as a Pioneer Evangelist for the Gloucester Centre of Mission - a partnership between the Diocese of Gloucester and Church Army. Sonya has preached several times here at St Paul and St Stephen. In November 2023, the PCC had an opportunity to hear of her work withing the community and to pray with her. Thank you, Sonya.

We give thanks for all those who have previously worshipped with us and have moved on or are no longer with us. I particularly give thanks for the life of George Merchant, who offered his time, skills, and

resources, and served with great diligence and dedication here at St Paul and St Stephen. May he rest in peace and rise in glory!

After my licensing, one of my key objectives was to get a better understanding of this parish and community. It has been a great joy attending various community events such as the Park Forum and Music Works, as well as engaging with various stakeholders such as our local councillors, business owners and community builders. I have been getting to know the different schools, shops, cafés, and businesses in the community and can agree that Seymour's do a great cooked breakfast!

As I have been getting to know people and this place, it is evident to me that God is at work. There are signs of green shoots where God is already working.



Over this last year, we have collectively reflected on the Five Marks of Mission to discern where these green shoots are. I chose the Five Marks of Mission to help us audit our mission and ministry here and to discern which works should be taken forward and which should be put down. The use of the five marks of mission as a framework is an ongoing process that we will continue to guide our ministry and I look forward to continuing this journey of discernment and mission here in this parish.

The Five Marks of Mission:

- 1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom.
- 2. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers.
- 3. To respond to human need by loving service.
- 4. To transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation.



5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

As we reflected on this, against what is already happening here at St Paul and St Stephen, the green shoots became more evident. Some of these are:

- intergenerational worship,
- discipleship,
- being a presence in the far-flung areas of our parish,
- ecumenical engagements,
- community engagements,
- and taking care of God's creation.

It is my hope that we focus on the first three items on this list and engage with the others as golden threads across the three.

With these three, various missional opportunities arise, and we must ask ourselves:

- How does worship that ministers to all generations look like?
- In what ways can we deepen our faith and what does that look like?
- What tools and resources can we use to help us with the deepening our faith?
- How can we be a Christian presence to the far-flung areas of our parish?

This year, we will take a deep dive into the five marks of mission and explore how they could be a practical reality in our parish. I also look forward to praying and exploring together how these three priorities (intergenerational worship, discipleship and being a presence) can be actualised in our parish.

I am glad to share that it has been lovely continuing with our relationships with our local schools. I took up the role of foundation governor at St Paul's Church of England primary school. At the end

of the summer term, the headteacher Mrs Steph Mathews moved on to become the headteacher at Kingsholm Church of England Primary School. We are grateful for her leadership at the school and for the good relationships with the church here. We pray for her as she now leads Kingsholm CofE primary school, may they know God's richest blessings. In the autumn term, Mrs Jayne Beavans was appointed as the new head teacher at St Paul's CofE Primary school. We continue to pray and support her as she takes the school forward. I have taken several assemblies at St Paul's CofE Primary school, and they came into the church building for their Harvest Thanksgiving service, Christmas Carol service and Nativity service.

The Rev'd Sonya Newton, who is a Church Army Pioneer Evangelist, took lead with Linden Primary School and has maintained a good relationship with them. The school came into the church building for their Harvest Thanksgiving service and a session of Explore Christmas.

We are also delighted to have continued our relationship with Tredworth Junior school. It was a joy to welcome the school into the church building for their Christmas nativity services.

Through the Christmas season, it was incredible that almost a thousand pupils and their parent/carers came into our church building. We continue to pray that we may maintain and enhance these links with our schools. We also pray that these opportunities that pupils and families get to come into the church building, will be moments that they will meet with God.

During Advent, we ran two bible study groups focusing on the four themes of Advent - Hope, Peace, Joy and Love. It was an enriching time together as we explored what each of these four themes mean to us especially in the context of waiting for the coming of Christ at Christmas.

We had the pleasure of singing Christmas Carols at St Paul Nursing Home - it was such a joyous occasion. Special thanks to Jan Wood who continues to organise us in offering pastoral care to the residents of St Paul Nursing Home.

At church we sang our Christmas Carols under candlelight and were led by Pamela Dewick and her team. It was incredible to hear part of the Christmas narrative being read to us by young Zachary. Families gathered for our Everyone's Nativity service which was led very well by Ruth and Andy.

This year has been a time of settling in, knowing the parish, understanding how things are usually done here, establishing relationships and discerning where God is already at work - noticing the green shoots.

It is evident that relationships with the schools, community, businesses, various stakeholders, and community leaders are important to mission and ministry in this parish. The other relationship that is of paramount importance is our relationship with Christ. In John 15:5, Jesus tells his disciples that 'I am the true vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing' (NRSV). It is my prayer that as individuals and as a worshipping community, we continue to nurture and deepen our relationship with Christ, for through this, we will be able to bear fruits that will nourish our community. These green shoots that we see, can only bear fruit when we remain in Christ.

St Paul and St Stephen PCC report

At the beginning of 2023 the PCC members were Ruth Parsons (CW) Andy Winter (CW) Lynda Lundregan, Ann Minchin, Rachael Hawkins, Pam Wells, Helen Scott, Julie Holder and Graham Brooks (deanery synod rep). Charles Minchin is our treasurer and although we are very grateful he attends some PCC meetings he is not a member of the PCC.

Rev James Njue was licenced in May 2023. He moved into King Edwards Avenue with his wife Ali and daughter Wambo; there son Munyi was born in October 2023.

The PCC met 7 times in 2023. In February the main discussion was about finances and that we had paid our parish share even though it was reduced. Updating of the giving mechanics was required. Rev James appointment was confirmed, and he would commence his mission in May.

We met again in April and as our finances had improved. We talked about the welcome and service for our new incumbent. The tryptic went on loan to Wotton Lawn Hospital.

The APCM was held in April and Anne Minchin stepped down as PCC secretary; Julie Holder agreed to take on the role. Mavis Anderson left the PCC and Viv Drewe joined the PCC. The APCM minutes were sent out so corrections could be made while details were still fresh in people's minds.

In June Rev James spoke of his vision for the future using the 5 T's: Tell, teach, tend, transform treasure and he wanted to audit what had been done in the past.

In September we discussed the church website and migrating email addresses. Safeguarding information was being updated however some parishioners were struggling to access the courses. A contactless giving scheme was discussed. Covid measures were

reviewed, and it was agreed that we would continue with 2 offerings, in tincture and the common cup.

In October we agreed to purchase a contactless machine. The NHS baby clinic moved out, so income was lost. The churchwardens agreed for Roma church to use the hall 4 days a week. In November Rev Sonia Newton introduced herself to the PCC and explained her role. The Parish share payment total was agreed at £26,000 with the diocese. Hall lettings are unpredictable and ways of getting more regular bookings was discussed. Schools have returned for their Christmas events.

As we serve God in this place, we are grateful for one another's cheerful and supportive presence.

Churchwardens Fabric and Maintenance report 2023

Ruth Parsons and Andy Winter were elected as Churchwardens at the APCM Sunday 30th April 2023.

Both Churchwardens have been especially vigilant regarding Safety Issues with the risk assessments completed and all relevant checks have been done.

These and other activities completed during 2023 are recorded in the Church Maintenance Logbook held in the vestry safe. The terrier and inventory have been completed and are an accurate record of articles belonging to the church. Two bookcases have been donated to the church by the family of Willie Beart. In addition a Beart family donation has enabled us to purchase a Contactless Giving Machine and we record our grateful thanks to the Beart family for it.

Whilst in vacancy the two churchwardens take the lead in maintaining our church and its buildings and grounds, but many members of our community have been of invaluable helping to keep it neat, tidy and safe. During 2023 after many years' service George Marchant handed over care and maintenance of our grounds and especially the Memorial Gardens to Brian Elder and Anne Minchin. George died within a few weeks and we celebrated his life and Faith at his funeral in the autumn. We are immensely grateful to these people for their service.

We sincerely thank all those who help to keep our church clean and tidy with especial mention of Kriss and Jayne Warburton, who have brought their professional cleaning skills to us. We should also mention Lynda Lundregan who unfailingly cares for our church linen. Many others contribute with little recognition but we do appreciate you all.

Mike Parsons has continued to help with upgrading our equipment. During 2023 he arranged for the replacement of the Wi-Fi router and servicing of our music system and we thank him for his help. The church fabric continues to give us cause for concern. The gutters were cleaned in March 2023(and again in 2024) by Forrester Access and we await Dave Williams our builder doing remedial work on our leaking downpipes.

We hosted an Easter egg hunt and activity morning with Elim Church on Maundy Thursday and look forward to continuing to work with Pastor Pete and his team in future events.

On Good Friday Mike Parsons had a small part in the drama 'The Way of the Cross' performed on Westgate Street and in the Cathedral grounds. Rev Tom Clammer led our last hour at the cross reflections...

At the end of April we held our APCM and Andy Winter and Ruth Parsons were appointed as Churchwardens for the year. In early May we celebrated the Coronation of King Charles III with an open day enjoyed by many families from our community.

A large congregation of bishops, other clergy, family, friends and parishioners witnessed the Licensing of the Reverend Captain James Njue to the position of Mission Enabler/Priest - in - Charge of our Parish of St Paul and St Stephen on Sunday 21st May 2023.

A week later we held a less formal welcome service with a bring and share lunch.

On their arrival James and Ali shared the wonderful news that they were expecting another baby and in September we welcomed Munyi into the vicarage family.

Due to his paternity leave, James was unable to attend the McMillan Coffee Morning in late September and the Harvest Festival Supper and service in early October. We would like to thank Helen Scott and Rachael Hawkins for carrying on Willy Beart's legacy with the Coffee morning and helping to raise a significant donation in Willy's memory for a good cause.

The Harvest Supper was a feast of shepherds pie and apple crumble followed by a memorable Fair-Trade quiz run by Sarah Maidlow. We thank Sarah and the 'cooks' for a lovely evening.

Statistics for Mission 2023

The annual Mission Statistics have been completed and submitted to the Diocese. The church is asked to give information on the average number of people attending services, the number of baptisms, weddings and funerals. This gives a picture of emerging mission issues and helps for forward planning.

In 2023 at St Paul and St Stephens:

There were 8 baptisms, 4 weddings or wedding blessings and our clergy conducted 14 funerals [in church or at the crematorium].

Our average adult weekly attendance in October was 36 with on average 2 children.

Statistics are more than numbers and in 2023 one of our funerals was for a much-loved member of our church family, George Marchant. We give thanks for his life and faith, as we remember all that he brought to our lives and our church. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

Roma Church

Our greatest encouragement has undoubtedly been Rob, a Gloucester guy from a travelling background, who has a long criminal record and history of violence and depression, but who has experienced a powerful conversion to Christ, lights up every meeting we have and spreads the gospel among all his friends and family, bringing a number of them to church.

A new children's midweek ministry has started on Wednesday evenings, and the primary-aged children love coming. This is led by a Roma couple, who are brand new to any form of leadership. The men continue to meet on Thursday evenings, but the women prefer to meet in their homes on Fridays. We continue to be extremely grateful to God for the kindness and enduring welcome shown us by our brothers and sisters in Christ from St Paul's.

Contact Centre

As always, we are very thankful for using the Church for our contact sessions. Our families are very grateful for being able to have contact with their children and in a beautiful building. Many memories are gained from the beautiful windows when children visit!

Numbers are steady at the moment and seen an increase in families 'moving on' from contact to out into the community. Which is a pleasure to know we have been a great stepping stone for families to gain back trust and communication.

We are always happy to support the Church where we can and look forward to the Quiet Room work commencing.

Treasurer report Notes to the accounts:

Our financial position looks a lot healthier than it was last year, but only because the diocese are accepting a substantially lower Parish Share than we have been paying in the past - and nothing like enough to cover the actual costs of employing a vicar.

Hall lettings have, on the whole, prospered but there is plenty of unused capacity for anyone seeking a venue for a party or some other gathering. The mainstay of our income remains the generous giving of the entire congregation.

The different funds are as follows:

The unrestricted fund can be spent as the PCC chooses with its main demand being the Parish Share followed by the upkeep of services in the Church and of the Church building. Present P.C.C. policy is that we should acknowledge God's generosity in giving to us by giving away 10% of our income, one third each to a local charity, a national charity, and an international charity. A consultation about who should benefit from this provision at the end of 2024 is ongoing.

The restricted fund is almost all monies given to the Roof Appeal a number of years ago and cannot be spent on other than that purpose even though the full work on the roof is likely to be much more than the funds available. A donation forming a new Garden Fund was given this year by George Marchant (who had devoted so much of his time caring for the church Garden) not long before his death and that stands now at £147.

The designated fund is that set aside by the PCC for a particular purpose, in this case for boosting the Roof Appeal. Designation can be reversed at the PCC's sole discretion if this is felt appropriate.

Many thanks to all of you whose generosity enables our Church to fulfil its calling in the kingdom of God in this community.
